

# JAIL CLEARED OF ALL ITS INMATES

## Judge Osborne Gives Sixteen Prison Terms and Treats Twenty-four Leniently.

Preparatory to going on his vacation Judge Harry V. Osborne, in the Court of Special Sessions, Tuesday cleaned out the county jail by sentencing eleven prisoners to the reformatory, five to the penitentiary and placing twenty-four on probation or suspended sentence. None was sent back to the jail, several whose cases were not disposed of being paroled until the fall for further action.

Miss Frances Hyland, twice convicted as a loan shark and sentenced in May to a year in the penitentiary, was put on probation because of her poor health. She promised not to engage in the loan business again.

Thomas Livingston, sixty-five years old, who has served the greater part of a year's sentence for killing a fellow member of a crew on a river boat after a quarrel over his false teeth,

was let out under a suspended sentence.

### Medical Wizard Jailed.

"Professor" Thomas Drew, a negro, 22 School street, who was convicted this week of practicing medicine without a license, was given eighteen months. Drew claimed to be a magnetic healer.

Alexander MacGregor, forty-nine, 30 Steuben street, East Orange, who was bailed out of jail and given a job by John Reeves, an East Orange grocer, last winter when he was arrested for embezzling and who repaid the kindness by embezzling \$93 from Reeves, was sentenced to eighteen months.

Year sentences were given James H. Murray, Bloomfield, who pleaded guilty to getting money on a fraudulent check, and William Evans, a negro, 72 Charlton street, for stealing a bicycle.

Walter Morris, eighteen, 27 Academy street, who, violating his probation July 11, gave Probation Officer Basile a chase before he would submit to arrest, was sent to the reformatory.

Jackie Dobbs, a prizefighter, who recently was sent to the penitentiary for six months on a serious charge, was sent to the reformatory.

Others sentenced were:

To the penitentiary, Daniel F. Gibbons, for violating probation, sent back to the penitentiary to serve time on an old charge.

To the reformatory, Charles C. Cahalin, larceny; Louis M. Libello and Joseph Del Gauerclo, assault and battery; Louis Kerestasy, burglary; Joseph Travisano, assault and carrying concealed weapons; Nathaniel German, burglary; Richard P. Smiley, larceny, and Eugene Bohler, burglary.

To the Woman's Reformatory at Clinton, Blanche Pepelek.

Among those put on probation was Constantine Lewandowski, the Philadelphia man, who was arrested in Caldwell with a gun in his possession while he was searching for his daughter, who had eloped. The daughter was in court and informed him that she was married and kissed him, but he wouldn't believe her until she produced a witness. Then he forgave her.
